Envisioning our Future: Restructuring the Academic Library through Radical Collaboration

Designing a Specialty Commons: What You Need to Know About Furniture, Equipment, and Technology Before Designing your Own

This program will feature a panel discussion of space, furniture, equipment considerations in five specialty commons in three academic libraries in Michigan, North Carolina, and California including a library data lab, a learning commons, digital media lab, a technology sandbox, and SAND (spatial and numeric data) center.

Evolution of the Academic Library Building: a Forum on Recent Planning, Design, and Construction of New Library Space

This program will present results and analysis of a recently completed study on new academic library buildings completed between 2003 and 2010. Following the report, three case studies of new library buildings will be presented and will include overviews of planning considerations, new trends in library design and use, and the role of the new library building in campus life. The discussion will be moderated by an architect who specializes in library design.

Return on Investment in a Tough Economy -- Defining the Value of the Academic Library Highlights two projects to help academic libraries apply return on investment (ROI) principles to demonstrate their value and impact on users and justify the expense during challenging economic times. Cawthorn and Herold will explain the application of Triple (people, planet, and profit) Bottom Line Accounting (TBLA) to ROI while King will discuss the IMLS-grant-funded Lib-Value (Value, Outcomes, and Return on Investment of Academic Libraries) that will develop approaches to assessing the value/ROI of library services.

Succession Planning and Leadership Development: Are You Ready?

According to research conducted by the Library Journal, 40% of the nation's librarians will have retired by the end of this decade. Libraries have to make sure they are ready. Demand for service is increasing as budgets are decreasing. As key staff leave at an every increasing rate it becomes critical to strategically plan how library resources will be used to train and develop staff in order to fill the gaps. Are you ready?
